How will planning decisions be made?



- All planning decisions will be aligned with the Park's General Plan and the Guiding Principles in the Reimagining Big Basin Vision Summary.
- These documents help establish a planning framwork that includes ongoing community and stakeholder engagement.
- The Project Team considers technical and environmental studies, information about programming needs from the California State Parks Santa Cruz District Working Group, and feedback from the Public.
- The Project Team develops a draft plan document in each of the three planning phases. Previous documents help refine the planning framework for the next phase.
- The California State Parks
 Planning and Aquisition
 Committee (PAC) approves
 the document.

Engagement Commitments

- Establishing **appropriate communication** with community members, stakeholders and partners and working to build trust;
- Using a *variety of approaches* to meaningfully engage with community members, stakeholders and partners in order to understand their perspectives;
- Finding creative and equity-driven ways to reduce barriers to participation for underrepresented groups to ensure that facility designs are responsive to the needs of all Californians:
- Setting clear expectations about how input will be used, where there is flexibility in
 design decisions, and where project goals and existing plans do not allow flexibility;
- Where possible, incorporating potential design adjustments to address community concerns without compromising project goals.
- Demonstrating how input influenced the plan and is reflected there.

WHAT IS THE DISTRICT WORKING GROUP?

WHAT IS THE PAC?

The California State Parks Planning and Acquisition Committee (PAC) is comprised of statewide division chiefs and is responsible for establishing priorities and subsequent management-level decisions for the department's acquisition and planning programs. This body will be responsible for approving the FMP and CEQA document. There will be three presentations to the PAC during the planning process.
